At the Founding, the American notion of freedom was both political and moral. Drawing upon the English legal tradition of corporate liberty, the Protestant tradition of personal selfdiscipline, and the classical tradition of duty, the American Founders argued that a republic can survive only if its leaders practice public virtue and civic responsibility, and that the greatest support of public virtue was private virtue among the people.
