WHO: Jennifer Newsome Martin is an assistant professor at the University of Notre Dame in

the Department of Theology's Program of Liberal Studies. She is a systematic theologian whose research focus includes trinitarian theology, 19th and 20th century Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox theology, religion and literature, theological aesthetics, French feminism, ressourcement theology, and the nature of religious tradition. Her first book, *Hans Urs von Balthasar and the Critical Appropriation of Russian Religious Thought*, won the Manfred Lautenschlaeger Award for Theological Promise in 2017. She

earned her master's degree and doctorate from the University of Notre Dame.
